The students also received some hands-on experience which consisted of attempting to lift their own fingerprints, participating in demonstrations of the SWAT Team equipment and learning what our deputies encounter on a typical work day. I am extremely thankful for the opportunity to be a part of this recognition to our office and look forward to continuing with the Citizens' Academy.

Sheriff's Corner

Aramark has continued their support in recognizing the hard work of the employees of the Tulsa County Sheriff's Office. This was once again evident during the 4th of July luncheon they recently hosted. The meal was delicious and I enjoyed the opportunity to visit with many of you during this festive occasion. Thanks to Aramark and the personnel who worked to provide such a nice meal.

You are all aware that the Swine Flu (H1N1), Chicken Flu, and the Bird Flu (H5N1) have been in the news recently. The H1N1 Flu has been labeled as a Pandemic Flu by the World Health Organization. Many law enforcement agencies and first responders are attempting to prepare for this epidemic. I have been able to purchase the NT-V2 personal respirator in a sufficient quantity to protect our agency and the jail if the flu should become evident in Tulsa. The Center for Disease Control is presently developing a serum for flu shots this year, and the latest article in the Tulsa World indicated that there would be a total of three injections to fully protect. There have been three incidents in Europe where the patients were given Tama Flu, which has been prescribed by physicians in America; it has been ineffective due to the constant changes in the virus structure. The mask that we have purchased will protect you from this virus as well as others and should be available soon. We are presently working on a protocol for the use of these masks in all operations and the jail.

The Sheriff's Office was recently invited to join the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation's Executive Development Program. This program is designed to enhance supervisory skills, perceptions and techniques. This program was created by DeWade Langley, Director of OSBI, and has been in existence for over two years. He has allowed us ten slots and two alternates. I am very proud of those

who have accepted this challenge of life-long learning and self analysis. All supervisory staff will be asked to attend and apply the skills they acquire from this training to both their personal and professional lives. The class was held at the OSBI's Academy in Edmond, Oklahoma. The first session was entitled "Character Counts". The classes will be held on the last Thursday of each month for one year. I think this program will be beneficial to our office and I am honored that we were asked to join.

It is with sadness that we send our deepest sympathy to retired Deputy Rex Woodfork for the loss of his daughter. Thank you to all who attended the services and supported him during his time of sorrow.

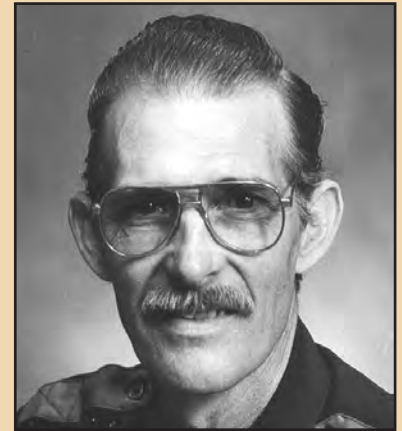

Driver's License Renewal

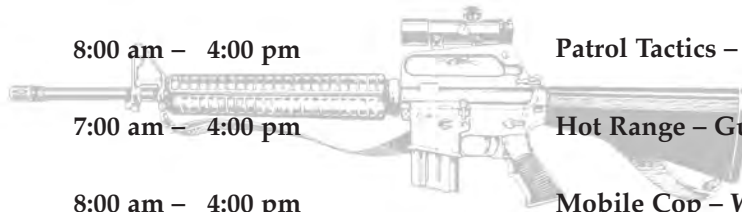

"Mystery Caller" Part III

Charles Fray was only convicted of one murder, that of his wife, Lucille Fray. Evidence against him of the murder of his ex-wife Laura and the wounding of Marshal Curtis was placed in the court record. It would only take the jury three and one half hours to determine Charles Fray's fate. He was found guilty of Lucille's murder and sentenced to death in the electric chair. This was the first death sentence in Tulsa County since 1922.

As Deputy Bill Pinion escorted the condemned prisoner from the courtroom Fray stated, "That's just what I wanted." As the two men entered the jail elevator Fray repeated again, "That's just what I wanted." When the condemned prisoner arrived in the jail he stated to the county jailers, "Well, they gave me the electric chair."

On October 6th, Charles Fray's execution date was set. Judge Luther James stated, "It will be the judgment of the court that you be taken in charge by the sheriff, to be transported to the state penitentiary and there delivered to the warden, and that you be executed according to the law on the twenty-first day of December." Charles stated he would not appeal, telling his mother and lawyer, "I'd just as soon go. It doesn't make any difference to me." But his mother refused to give up. She had an appeal filed anyway and began a crusade to save her son. A stay was granted pending the appeal. In January of 1930, the Oklahoma Criminal Court of Appeals affirmed Fray's sentence. His execution was scheduled for March 28, 1930.

On March 13, 1930, trustees took Charles his breakfast and asked him how he was doing. He replied, "Not very good." The next time the trustees saw Charles Fray, he was hanging from his bunk. Charles Fray had hanged himself with his blanket. His mother

Anna Fray, Mother Fray, of Jenks had never given up on her only son. She had just written a letter to Governor Holloway just a few days before asking for his help. Maybe knowing his mother would never stop trying to stop his execution, I guess Charles Fray was determined, one way or the other, to get just what he wanted.

The 'mystery caller' was never identified.

Additional Information

Fray had left three notes in his cell; one to his mother asking her to take care of his baby, one to the Governor asking his help for an inmate on death row who he believed was innocent, and one to the public stating 'I am an innocent man as far as I know', but warning of the evils of the bootlegging trade.

The only motive for his anger towards A.G. Curtis was apparently because Curtis had once taken a gun away from him in Jenks. Fray possibly believed that Curtis was a threat to his plan because he knew he would stand up to him and do his job. A.G. Curtis would recover from his wounds and would later work for Sheriff A. Garland Marrs, 1935-1948.

Fray would claim that he could not recall the day of the shooting until he awoke in the hospital. He also denied remembering a conversation with reporters where he recalled the events of the shooting the following morning. The prosecution brought out facts pertaining to the divorce of Laura and Charles a few months before, where it was claimed that he went to Sapulpa and at gunpoint on a lonely road took Laura's wedding ring back, held her hostage over night, and forced her under threat to convey the ice plant and home property back to him. He admitted getting the property back, but did not explain how or why. He would later be evicted from the house.
