Grand Jury Indicts Sheriff Sanford

Part II

After turning over their recommendations to Judge Kennamer on Saturday, July 30th, the nature of the indictments would not be learned publicly until the following day. Both Sheriff Sanford and Chief Moran were indicted for violating the prohibition laws. Chief Moran faced one indictment, his bond set at \$3,000. Sheriff Sanford faced two indictments, with a bond of \$6,000. Both men put up their bonds and when asked, stated they would not resign.

Sheriff Sanford had not yet read his charges, so he offered no comment. Chief Moran, after having prior knowledge of his charges, stated, "I have all the respect in the world for the grand jurors who returned this indictment against me, and I feel they were acting in good faith in dealing with the testimony, which apparently was presented to them. I will await the trial of this case, at which time I expect to prove that I have been guilty of no violation of the law."

On Monday, August 1, 1927, Mrs. Mabel Bassett, State Commissioner of Charities and Corrections, informed the Associated Press that she intended on asking Attorney General Dabney to start ouster proceedings against Sheriff Sanford and four of his Jailers, George Stewart, Elmer King, Joe Huff and Joe Wilson. Mrs. Bassett repeated her earlier charges against Sheriff Sanford that he was allowing "wild parties" and an inmate's "kangaroo court" inside the Tulsa County Jail.

With the urging of Mrs. Bassett, the county commissioners passed a resolution directing the county attorney to investigate the charges and report

back to them. County Attorney Kirkpatrick stated that there were three reasons for ouster proceedings towards a Sheriff; malfeasance of office, drunkenness and conviction of a felony. The county attorney felt there was no basis for any ouster proceedings to start until the grand jury indictments were resolved.

On the same Monday, the indictments against the sheriff were made public. In the first indictment, Sheriff Sanford was charged jointly, along with Jailer Joe Wilson, in allowing a federal prisoner by the name of Dan Ward to escape from the county jail. The sheriff stated he had received a release for Ward from the U.S. Marshal's Office. In the second indictment, the sheriff was charged jointly, with jailer George Stewart, with possession of whiskey. It was alleged that Sheriff Sanford gave a gallon of whiskey to Captain Roy Bolton of the Tulsa County Highway Patrol during a supper in the Sheriff's Office on September 7, 1925. The sheriff stated that he did not recall this incident.

Mrs. Mabel Bassett also went after the county attorney, asking the governor to initiate ouster proceedings against him as well. In responding to these allegations, County Attorney Kirkpatrick stated that the affidavits were from "some of the very best known and leading criminals of Tulsa County." He pointed out that the affidavits were received through leading and suggestive questions, with the enticement of receiving a pardon or parole by the inmates who participated. The county attorney also stated, "I have no confidence in the official or personal integrity of the commissioner of

charities and corrections." He went on to praise Sheriff Sanford and his deputies for cleaning up the hijackers in Tulsa County.

Mrs. Mabel Bassett argued the truth of the 56 affidavits she had obtained with the state attorney general's office in the state capitol. Mrs. Bassett told the Tulsa Tribune over the telephone that she hoped to receive better cooperation from state officials than she had received from county officials regarding the reported conditions at the Tulsa County Jail. She reiterated her charges that County Attorney Kirkpatrick and members of the county commission were guilty of gross neglect of duty in refusing to investigate the affidavits concerning the shocking conditions purporting to be extant in the Tulsa County Jail. Mrs. Bassett also denied the county attorney's charge that she had promised pardons or paroles to any of the inmates she had received affidavits from.

These affidavits reported three areas of misconduct; cruelty received by the inmate's kangaroo court, poor quality and quantity of food and liquor immorality. Mrs. Bassett sought the ouster of not only Sheriff Sanford, but his Undersheriff Charles Price, and Jailers Joe Wilson, George Stewart, Elmer King and Joe Huff. At this time, Jailers Joe Wilson and George Stewart were no longer employed at the Sheriff's Office. George Stewart had already resigned on July 15th, having been indicted on two liquor possession charges. Joe Wilson was charged with allowing a federal inmate, Dan Ward, to escape the county jail.

D.O. Linda Morris

The first VIDEO COURT at David L. Moss CJC was held on August 19th, 1999. Three to four courts were held daily with an average of 24,000 defendants arraigned in a year. We would like to highlight both D.O. Linda Morris and D.O. Donna Rice for their long tenure and for their great teamwork in Video Court. On January 5, 2000, a fifth court was added in "Night Court". Court was held seven days a week at 2200 hrs. Judge Kyle Haskins and D.O. Morris were both grateful that it only lasted for two months. On February 26, 2000, "Weekend/Holiday Court" started and is currently still held. There are eighteen judges that rotate and hold court at the jail. Each year, 12,000 to 15,000 defendants are arraigned in Video Court. A vast amount of mandatory procedures and paperwork is required to expedite court in a professional manner to accommodate the judicial system. D.O. Donna Rice and D.O. Linda
